Eastmorland Garden News, Summer 2012

The delicacy of plants and gardening gives one the sense of being a part of something bigger. At each moment, the balance needed to maintain the life of the plant is linked to the next. Water, sun, soil, drainage, and space all play a part. Depending on the type of crop, orchard, or plot, our gaze into the future can vary in length. It is this sense of time which captures different plants in different ways. The difference between the salad gardener, the pumpkin harvester, and the orchard grower can be immense.

A salad gardener tends to have a very short growing season. Radishes are notoriously a fabulous veggie to plant with those anxious and very green in the thumb children who want to eat the seeds before they hit the dirt. In only two short weeks, a speck of dust turns into a bright red, radish with some pungent kick to tell the young gardener that this is a fresh one straight from the soil. So too with greens; in a few short weeks chefs of the younger generation can be boasting a bowl filled with a nice variety of shapes, sizes, and colors.

This contrasts with the pumpkin harvester. Pumpkins take a lot of space and mounding. They spread out their vines into the other rows, sometimes souring the taste of their neighbors. They frankly do best in a patch by themselves, where they only have each other to bump into. First the large, dark green plants emerge from the ground. Their leaves spread out like a condor's wings to shade their little bit of Eden. A burst of color is the pride of the blossoms; most of which are allowed to grow into the fruit of Thanksgiving pies. Some more trendy might pinch off the flowers and prepare them in their immaturity: that of the cook or the flower is a matter of opinion. Yet, as slow as the season long process of ripening occurs, a single night below the hallowed 32 degrees Fahrenheit can shatter the life right out of the little and big Jacks sitting in the low lying fields.

Finally, the ultimate in patience is the orchard grower. Apples, olives, and hickory nuts all have their finer points. Apple orchards need to be pruned and tended for pests. An old set of friends from Eastmorland planted some apples at a nearby church; with their aging and departing, the task of ridding the branches of bugs has been neglected in the past few years. These trees are bearing jewels as best as they can without their stewards; a hat without a cane, one shoe without the other. Stories abound of one generation planting olive trees only to know they will not benefit from the harvest; trusting that the next

generation will desire and be nourished by this inheritance. Then, there are the older nut trees which have become the domain of the squirrels on the Schenk playground. Their fruits available for all those with initiative and knowledge. Many are left to the whimsy of the playground battlefields when school monitors have turned their backs.

Which brings us to remember those times in our lives when someone has gifted us green life. The elderly neighbor who shared her rhubarb with a young family. The Olbrich Garden volunteers who divided their flowers and were able to tell someone if that bunch would like to be replanted in sun or in shade. The free Mum for Mother's day which arrived at a busy home to brighten and reflect beauty to the lives near it. The fine line between life and death in our gardening gives a window to how intricate the patchwork of time in our world really is both for ourselves and those things which we are stewards over.

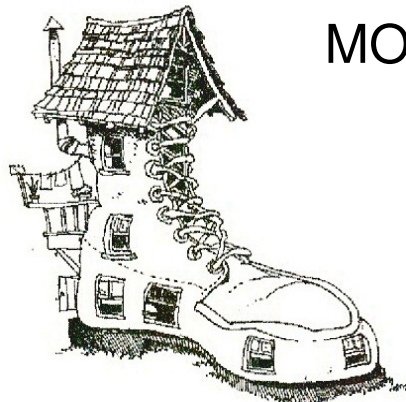

From Our County Supervisor

Over the last few weeks, I've had a great time visiting our Eastside neighborhood associations, helping out with Field Day at Kennedy Elementary School, talking about economic development with the

Madison Chamber of Commerce, and meeting many of our wonderful high school students at the annual GSAFE dinner.

I also was appointed to serve on the Dane County Airport Commission, the Madison Community Foundation, the Madison Development Corporation, and the Wisconsin Counties Association Board of Directors. It'll mean a lot more meetings, but also present a lot of opportunities to do great work as well.

There are a lot of great things going on in Dane County. This month we were excited to learn the economic impact of the Dane County arts and cultural programs are double that of similar size communities, which really demonstrates how successfully we have integrated our community building and economic development work.

Additionally, the Henry Vilas Zoo recently began selling healthier concessions, including turkey, ham, and tuna salad sandwiches with vegetables, lean meats, and fresh-made bread. This is part of a conscious effort to improve the zoo's food op-

tions, which began with serving fresh fruit last year.

In other exciting news, for the first time in Dane County history, half of the County Board's committee chairs are women. Dane County is only the second county board in Wisconsin to reach gender equality within its leadership.

While there are a lot of exciting developments going on, there are two significant updates on the landfill and around housing issues:

Improved Recycling & Turning Garbage into Gasoline

Frankly, I'm amazed at all the innovative work happening at our landfill. This June, Dane County began construction of a new \$4-million recycling center that will greatly expand the county's recycling efforts, extend the life of the county landfill, and make the popular 'Clean Sweep' program operate year-round.

The centerpiece of this new comprehensive solid waste strategy is a waste transfer station that will allow for the recycling of construction and demolition waste, which currently account for 40% of the space in the county's landfill. The transfer station will extend the life of the county's current landfill site another three decades.

Part of a comprehensive effort to "save money by going green," the new facility will include:

- An eco-friendly heating system fueled by the excess heat generated when landfill gases are converted to renewable energy;
- Special pavement that catches rainfall and keeps waste runoff from flowing into neighboring waterways; and
- Translucent panels that will utilize natural light for the facility, greatly reducing electrical power consumption.

Even the trucks that haul the recyclables to their sorting stations will be green, running on compressed natural gas (bio CNG) that is created from decomposing trash in the landfill.

Additionally, the new transfer station will keep the popular

Protecting Access to Housing & Reducing Homelessness

While the Madison housing market is slowly recovering in the wake of the foreclosure crisis and economic downturn, access to affordable, stable housing continues to be a challenge for many people in our community.

Last year, the State legislature eliminated Wisconsin's housing discrimination protections for Section 8 renters. The County Board restored those protections under the Dane County ordinances this spring to ensure equal access to housing.

Additionally, following the dissolution of the Occupy Madison camp on East Washington Ave., the County Board created a committee to review the homelessness problems facing Dane County and to propose immediate and long-term recommendations that will better serve everyone in our community. I look forward to reading their recommendations later this year.

That's all for this month! I hope folks are enjoying the summer, and I look forward to catching up at neighborhood picnics and events. Please, don't forget to vote in the August 14th Primary Election (it is a month earlier than previous years)!

From Our State Representative

Hello, neighbors. The State Legislature is adjourned until January, 2013 when all the legislators elected in the November 6, 2012 general elections are sworn into office. Despite the legislature being out of session, there are still important issues moving forward that impact tens of thousands of people, including BadgerCare Plus.

BadgerCare Plus is Wisconsin's Medicaid program to provide health insurance for uninsured families and childless adults. BadgerCare Plus currently provides critical health care for 751,000 individuals, including 471,000 children. Prior to this session, the legislature had the authority to propose modifications to the program and submit them to the Federal government, who has the ultimate say. In Governor Walker's budget, this legislative authority was transferred to him. Currently, Governor Walker's political appointee from the Heritage Foundation, Dennis Smith, has the sole power to propose changes to the BadgerCare Plus program.

Governor Walker's original BadgerCare Plus reductions would have affected BadgerCare Plus coverage for more than 300,000

Wisconsinites. His plan would have caused more than 64,000 Wisconsinites, including over 29,000 children, to lose their BadgerCare Plus coverage. Since many of Governor Walker's proposed changes conflicted with the federal health care reform law, which is known as the Affordable Care Act (ACA), he was forced by the Obama Administration to abandon most of his original plans.

The following changes were approved by the federal government and will be effective July 1, 2012:

- Requiring premiums for adults in BadgerCare Plus with incomes between 133% and 150% of the federal poverty level (whereas premiums currently start at 150% of FPL);

- Increasing premiums for non-pregnant, non-disabled adults with incomes over 150% of FPL;

- Dropping adults for a year, rather than six months, if they fail to make a premium payment on time;

- Ending BadgerCare Plus coverage for adults if they have access to employer-sponsored insurance and their premium would cost less than 9.5% of family income (regardless of how high the deductibles and co-pays are for that coverage);

- Ending eligibility of the spouse of an employee who has an offer of employer coverage, even if inclusion of the spouse would raise the premium above the 9.5% family income standard; and

- Ending retroactive eligibility for parents and caretaker relatives in families with income above 133% of the poverty level.

As a result of these changes, approximately 17,000 adults will lose their BadgerCare Plus coverage.

In addition, Governor Walker is still seeking federal approval of his proposal to create a plan with much higher co-pays and more limited benefits, which would cover families with incomes over 100% of the poverty level. If approved, Governor Walker's plan would adversely affect more than 300,000 BadgerCare Plus participants.

I believe that the ability of a society to be healthy and to thrive is dependent upon its inhabitants being healthy and having ac-

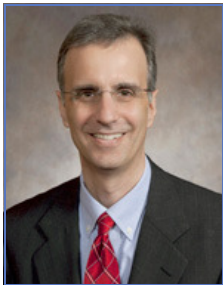

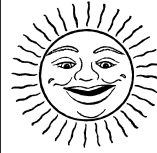
