Dangerous Pedestrian Crossing on Dempsey



Pictured above is a view of a pedestrian crossing mainly used on a daily basis by 150 to 300 employees of Woodman's to get to the employee parking lot shown in the background. Reportedly there have been several incidences where motor vehicles have nearly hit someone using this crossing. This situation needs to be corrected before someone is seriously injured or killed. One of the main problems is the obstructed view of this crossing to motorists traveling north down Dempsey Road before arriving at the crossing. This can been seen in the picture below. Most vehicles traveling towards Woodman's east parking entrance are concentrating on the vehicles leaving and entering and cannot see the pedestrian crossing. Dan Fredrickson, mgr. of Woodman's, has reported this situation to the city sometime ago, but has not received information how this will be resolved.

Spring is finally here, and with all the rain, not counting the snow evidence I saw this morning, the grass is getting green!

Some neighbors like to know what is going on at ECA Director meetings, hence the following information.

ECA appreciates its many volunteers! We could not function without each and every one of you. A good neighborhood takes all of us doing what we can to make it safe, clean, caring, and a great place to live. (Do you know that some folks have read our newsletter in the library and have called or sent

their dues to join us because they really like our caring for each other? They don't live in our neighborhood, but we tell them to let their neighborhood know what they would like changed in theirs. And we thank them for the kind words.)

Emerald Ash-Borer

Have you noticed the Ash trees in our neighborhood terraces (close to the street) with the big yellow circles on them? They are Ash trees that will be removed. Criteria: older trees, damaged or decayed trees, and trees that are smaller than 10 inches in diameter were the ones targeted by the city. I was coming home from the library the other day with Patrick and happened to notice a man in a city truck on our block, looking up into the canopy of an Ash tree. So, I went over to ask what he was doing. Since the Emerald Ash-Borer is coming, and cannot be stopped, Madison is planning to clear out the most susceptible Ash trees from city terraces.

Road Construction

Madison, in conjunction with the WisDOT, is proposing to reconstruct E. Johnson Street from N. Butler to N. Baldwin, with the start date of May 6, 2014. This project includes new storm sewer, sanitary sewer, water main, pavement replacement, curb & gutter, sidewalk, street lighting and tree installation.

Also, the Mineral Point Rd. & Junction Rd. project has begun and is expected to last until August 31, 2014. Mineral Point Rd. will be reconstructed from Pleasant View Rd. to the Beltline. Junction Rd. will be reconstructed from Isaac Dr. to Valley View Rd. A bridge will be constructed to carry traffic southbound on Junction Rd. over Mineral Point Rd.

Little and Big Things

City leaders are proposing that the city invest up to \$60 million into a hotel/ apartment complex downtown. This is about \$600 from each household in the city.

For a number of reasons I have been critical of this plan. This investment would be made south of the Capitol. Comparing the average increase in property values in each of the last 12 years for this area with the

non-downtown neighborhoods, we find that that the increase in this part of downtown has been 9.5 % each year while the increase in our neighborhoods has been 4%. Indeed, many of the neighborhoods in the 15th District have had little or no growth in value in the past decade.

Given these facts, it seems fair and sensible that the city should invest in the areas that need assistance. Instead, the plan invests in an area that is growing at a faster rate than any other part of the city.

The millions of dollars in low interest loans, tax deferrals, public works improvements (such as new streets) make such projects extremely profitable. Unlike the rest of us, the selected recipients of TIF dollars receive ALL of their property tax dollars back in improved infrastructure such as streets, lighting, etc. as well as low-interest loans.



Contrast this treatment with an Eastmorland resident who opened a coffee/sandwich shop in our area. He invested and borrowed thousands of dollars to rebuild the space and install new plumbing, electrical, etc. Not only did he not get a city loan, his property tax bill sharply increased as a result of his investments. He received no improvement in his cityinfrastructure. In other words, his increase in property taxes went to everybody BUT him.

His shop is a positive development for the neighborhood. Compare this benefit to what we will gain from a luxury hotel/ apartment complex on Wilson St.

This question will be asked in many forms and is critical to the quality of the city's life now and in the years to come: Should we focus on these "little things" in our neighborhood that maintain the fabric of our communities and serve the interests of city residents or the big "marquee" project that is expensive, risky and of dubious benefit except for a few?

German Apple Cake

This has proven very popular with friends and family, so I thought I would share. The recipe came from Penzey Spices catalog in 2013. — Kathy Soukup

4 cups peeled, diced apples, takes about 5 apples (I have used both Macintosh and Cortlands.)

- 2 cups white sugar
- 1 cup oil
- 2 eggs
- 1 tsp. pure vanilla extract
- 2 cups flour
- 1 tsp. Baking soda
- ½ tsp. Salt

2 tsp. of your favorite cinnamon

¹/₂ cup chopped nuts, if wished.

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Grease and flour a 9x13" pan and set aside. In a mixing bowl, combine the sugar, oil, eggs and vanilla. Add the flour, baking soda, salt and cinnamon and mix well. Stir in the apples (and nuts, if you wish) by hand. The batter will be very thick. Spoon into the pan, smooth the top with a spoon, and bake at 350 degrees for 50-55 minutes.

How you would like to make your trades will be up to you. You will need to be present with your items and items may not be left unattended.

No transportation or delivery will be provided. There will be no sales by participants on the premises; this is a swap, after all, not a sale.

County to open homeless day shelter by November

Dane County has announced plans to open a permanent homeless day resource center at Porchlight's Hospitality House, located at 1490 Martin Street. The new facility should be open by November 2014.

The facility will provide showers, laundry, and storage to make it easier for individuals who are homeless to conduct a job search, go to interviews, or maintain employment in order to secure permanent housing. Support services will include job search resources, counseling, housing assistance, as well as mental health and substance abuse assistance.

Dane County, the City of Madison, United Way and Downtown Madison, Inc. have pledged financial support for operations and renovations.

Transportation logistics will have to be addressed. Currently, shuttle buses run Monday-Friday to Hospitality House from the Salvation Army and the Drop-In Shelter downtown.

County begins construction of new pavilions at Alliant Energy Center

Dane County leaders broke ground on the New Holland Pavil-



ions, which will replace the existing barn facilies at the Alliant Energy Center. The two state-of-the-art facilities will provide a combined 29,000 square feet of multi-use space for some of Dane County's largest events.

The project is a public/private partnership among Dane County, the Wisconsin Department of Agriculture, Trade, and Consumer Protection (DATCP), World Dairy Expo, Midwest Horse Fair, New Holland Construction and Agriculture, and Centerplate Catering.

Road construction season begins

Dane County is readying for road reconstruction in several areas of the County. On Madison's eastside, Broadway Street just east of Stoughton Road (near the Dutch Mill Park and Ride) will be repaved, while in Fitchburg the county is concluding negotiations for reconstruction of Highway PD. Other roads will be assessed by the end of April for determining the impacts of the sever winter weather on Dane County roads.

City Now Taking Pre-Orders for Compost Bin and Rain Barrel Sale

Spring is finally here and that means it's almost time for the annual City of Madison Compost Bin and Rain Barrel Sale on Saturday, May 3, at the Alliant Energy Center parking lot.

This year's event features a modern rain barrel equipped with a high-flow spigot and includes a downspout diverter. Rain barrels as well as a sleeker designed compost bin are available in three different colors, brown, tan and gray. The standard rain barrels can hold 50 gallons and the larger systems can hold 200 gallons per downspout.

Rainwater harvesting and backyard composting are impactful, easy individual actions to protect Madison area waterways. As part of the Clean Lakes Alliance citizen action campaign, each customer will receive a "Renew the Blue" sticker with their rain barrel or compost bin purchase. It is estimated that over 8,000 homes in Madison already have rain barrels or compost bins.

Compost bins will be sold for \$79.99, normally \$129.99 and standard rain barrels are just \$119.99 with a diverter. Residents that pre-order before by April 23 will save an additional \$10 off and to pre-order your rain barrel and compost bin, supplies are limited, visit:

Neighborhood Awareness and Cleanup in O.B. Sherry Park and Starkweather Avenue Greenway.

Hi neighbors! Before this most recent arctic blast we actually had some real Spring Weather! Hopefully much more is soon to come. Spring reminds me how lucky I am to live in this beautiful area. My back yard is Sherry Park; I'm one building away from Starkweather Creek and its greenway. So along with the "wild" area behind Olbrich, Olbrich Gardens and the bike trail, it feels like an oasis of country in the middle of the city.

My husband and I have lived here ten years. Every day we see fifty or more people enjoying walking on the greenway, taking their families to the park, running, biking, kayaking, canoeing, and fishing in the area.

The area is also an oasis for wildlife. It is a very important stopover for migratory birds and summer home to hundreds of bird species {and bird watchers}. It is right off the Lake Monona Flyway and birds depend on this area for food, shelter and homes. This year I've already seen wood ducks and kingfishers fly over the creek, sandhill cranes dancing in Sherry Park, Canada geese, killdeers, ruby crowned kinglets, brown thrashers, and green herons scouting for food and nesting places. During the recent warm weather, painted turtles popped up to bask and spring peepers started to sing. There are several species of turtles and frogs and many kinds of fish in the creek. Every spring there are amazing sights to see from the Sherry Park bridge as huge muskies swim up the creek and warblers start to sing.

Over the years I've seen the water quality of Starkweather Creek go sharply up and down due to droughts, flooding, dumping, silt and landfill waste from erosion along steep banks and the work to correct these problems. I have seen entire carloads of trash left on the greenway several times. I have seen beds, shopping carts, bikes and large full rubbermaid containers all dumped in the creek. Anything discarded on the greenway usually ends up in the creek, either from human actions or weather, (flooding and wind).

My husband and I have tried to clean up as much as possible, but we are only two pair of eyes and hands. It has been very difficult to prevent the dumping and find out enough information to call the park ranger or police. In past years I have been questioned by police officers several times when they saw me working in my backyard gardens. They were investigating incidents behind Garver Feed Mill and wanted to know if I'd seen anything suspicious. Last fall I found two live traps on the greenway off Starkweather Avenue. They were only a couple feet from the area where many people walk with dogs and kids.




Trapping, according to the park rangers, is illegal in city parks and greenways, except by special permit. No permits have been issued for this area in recent years. Also, two weeks ago I found a floating cage and evidence of horrible animal abuse.

If you love this area also and are interested in keeping it as safe and clean as possible, please consider helping me start a neighborhood watch/awareness program. I propose a program to get to know each other better and be more aware of what's happening in Sherry Park, along the Starkweather Avenue greenway and behind Olbrich Gardens. We could share contact information; phone numbers and or e-mails. Then when someone sees something that may be suspicious or not normal we can contact each other and together report it online (tipsubmit.com) or by phone to the park ranger and neighborhood police officer. This program would never be a patrol, but rather more ears, eyes, and hands helping keep these areas safer and cleaner for people and animals. Once a week or month or whenever you can, when you are out enjoying a walk with your dog or your family or biking the trail or fishing the creek, take a trash bag and pick up as much as you can. While you enjoy the park and greenway also watch for anything that doesn't belong and let other know.

We are so lucky to live in a city of many beautiful parks. Please consider helping make this oasis in the middle of the city safer and cleaner. Let's share information, be more aware, help with clean up and ask for help when needed. Thanks so much for reading this and have a fantastic spring!

Big Step for a Stronger Workforce, Economy

We're all encouraged to see signs of economic recovery in Dane County. With this welcome news, we must take great care to ensure that as our community rebounds the opportunity exists for Dane County families from all walks of life to do the same.

For months I have worked with repre-

bare county executive sentatives from labor, business, and educational institutions, as well as economic and workforce development professionals to tackle a persistent challenge – connecting skilled employees with construction companies that are ready to hire, but are facing a worker shortage.

The result is a new initiative, Project Big Step, aimed at preparing the county's workforce for the growing construction industry – and assuring better access to these family supporting jobs to under-represented people, including minorities and women.

My Office of Economic and Workforce Development, together with the Workforce Development Board of South Central Wisconsin, will collaborate with the building trades contractors; community based organizations working in the construction trades, including WRTP Big Step; Construction Training, Inc./START; Operation Fresh Start; the Urban League of Greater Madison; and the Madison College Apprenticeship Program, to build and implement a comprehensive strategy.

Our multi-phase approach will focus on assessing the skills needed for a project and on recruiting and training the workforce necessary to get the job done. The effort will also identify and bring back workers who left the construction industry during the Great Recession, and ensure Big Step trainees get hired and retained in the industry.

With a series of major building projects ahead, including a new \$18 million expansion at our Alliant Energy Center, Dane County is uniquely positioned to work with key stakeholders to fulfill these goals.

With Big Step, we will strengthen our local economy and give our workforce the training and opportunity they need to find meaningful, family supporting employment.

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

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
